Meet the Author, Kristin Smedley

TEDx Speaker, Best Selling Author, Co-Creator, Thriving Blind Academy

Kristin Smedley is the Mom of three children, two of which were born blind. Kristin is a Best Selling author of Thriving Blind: Stories of Real People Succeeding Without Sight and What I Can Be Is Up To Me, a print + Braille children's book.

A recognized expert in the blindness and rare disease communities, Kristin won the highly regarded Champion of Hope Award, was named an Ambassador for the National Organization of Rare Disorders, and is a 2022 inductee into the Conwell-Egan Catholic Wall of Fame. Kristin is a popular, in demand speaker who has been invited to share her message at the NIH, United States Congress, the FDA, and national as well as international conventions, conferences and events.

As CEO of a global patient organization, she coordinated legislation (H.R. #625) that became the first in US history to be submitted in Braille. Kristin spoke at the FDA to help achieve the first ever FDA approved gene therapy to treat an inherited retinal disease in the United States. Her TEDx Talk, books and international summit change perceptions of blindness, and sparked a global movement, Thriving Blind Academy, that is solving the unemployment, literacy, and financial crisis in the blind the community.

Readers will:

- Learn about role models that access the world differently and are successful
- Be exposed to the success principles of Responsibility, Believe in Yourself, and Believe It's Possible
- Learn about the important literacy tool for the blind, Braille
- Understand that people with blindness/low vision are just like them - they just access the world a little differently
- Smile and enjoy the story!

What I Can Be Is Up To Me is a fun, engaging story that introduces young readers to real life people that do interesting things in this world. With rhythmic, action text, it invites readers to see themselves in the jobs those featured have.

Each page has an exciting action for the reader to envision (a mountain climber climbing! climbing! climbing! A skateboarder whoosh! whoosh! whoosh!).

The surprise: Although it is hinted at throughout the book, the reader does not find out until the end of the story that the stars of the story are all blind or low vision!

With characters that are all blind or low vision, this book gets the children engaged and excited about principles like:

- Take 100% Responsibility
- Believe It's Possible
- Believe In Yourself
- Access Tools for Success

Not only will blind/low vision children be empowered to believe in themselves, all children that experience this book will be empowered to believe in themselves no matter the adversity they may experience.

The uniqueness of What I Can Be Is Up To Me


- Gives young blind and low vision children role models for succeeding without sight

- "Characters" are from different races, ethnicity, nationality, and genders.
- Every person in the story has a disability (blindness/low vision).
- The print + braille format makes the book accessible for all readers.
- The illustrations were created by a visually impaired artist.

 lessons can parents and children learn from their experiences?
- In a world that increasingly values diversity and inclusion, what role do you see children's literature, like "What I Can Be Is Up to Me," playing in shaping young minds and fostering a more inclusive society?
